out side Syn. FASADE in the south we have discerned 2 or 3 ~~stages~~ ^{stages}

I ashlar building, unexplained ashlar corner in the east, AND ASHLAR
 PAVEMENT between the corner and the south wall of the syn. (the lower
 in the two ^{PAV} mentioned on the plan in the east.)
 No traces of this beautiful ashlar pavement were found west of the
 corner along the S. wall.

II rough pavement in two layers one above the other, the lower one
 uses ASHLAR stones in secondary use, capitals and a broken lion relief.
 The upper ~~one~~ ^{one} uses flat field stones.
 Both are covered by a rough, fast breacking plaster floor
 we consider the 3 layers (2 PAV. + PL. FL.) as one stage PAV. being made
 (we = G. NETZER AND ME)
 This pl. fl. covers in the east PAV. of stage I
 No PAV. is so far found below stage II all along the wall
 and I can not as yet explain why.

III another ASHLAR stones PAV. covers the II pl. fl. in the east
 This PAV. uses old stones in secondary rough use.

? A wall of field stones parallel to the south wall of the syn.
 using old columns erect in its construction belongs to either II or III
 prob. III.
